


NNCC sets fall registration

Humboldt County residents are sure to find a course or two of interest to them on the new Northern Nevada Community College schedule,

The college will open its doors for fall registration Aug. 30 from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. and Aug. 31 from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. The course schedule will appear in the Aug. 18 issue of *The Humboldt Sun* and will also be mailed to all Humboldt County residents on that date.

Financial Aid Director John Williams will be at the center on Aug. 31 from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Students needing financial aid should call the center, 623-4824, as soon as possible and make an appointment to see Williams.

All students anticipating signing up for either English or math for the first time need to take the appropriate placement test. Tests may be taken at the college center between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. Monday through Thursday, Students are strongly urged to call the center and make arrangements to take tests well in advance of registration.

Certain high school juniors and seniors may enroll in a limited number of college courses each semester. A written recommendation from the principal is required. If you have a 2.5 grade point average or higher, you may enroll for a maximum of two courses per semester during your senior year. Juniors must limit themselves to one course each semester,

and it must be an occupational or flict resolution workshop. Perhaps community service class.

The college offers a variety of selfpaced courses including business, economics, electronics, history, humanities, business law, math, office administration, word processing, sociology and American short story. These courses offer working adults flexible scheduling and takes into account individual differences in background and motivation.

Course requirements for the Associate of Arts, Associate of Science, Associate of Applied Science and Associate of General Studies, as well as several one-year certificates are offered at Northern Nevada Community College-Winnemucca Center. Students have a number of choices of classes in English, math and science, U.S. and Nevada constitutions, social sciences, fine arts and humanities and electives in order to complete their degrees.

The college is offering several new computer classes, including one for those who are afraid to touch the keyboard. In this class students will learn some basics in both the IBM compatible and Apple computers. Be sure and check the schedule for the computer class that is just right for

Do you experience conflict in your work place? Joyce Neary will help you develop creative skills necessary to resolve those conflicts in her conflict resolution workshop. Perhaps you want to improve your leadership skills. Then the two-day effective community leadership workshop is for you. Do you want to try your hand at creative cooking? This, first in a series, class will explore foods and food habits of different cultures. Students will enjoy the hands-on oriental wok cooking experience. Home owners will be thrilled, with the two-day landscape design class taught by horticulturists Dr. Wayne Johnson and Dick Post from UNR.

The causes and effects of World War II continue to engender interest to this day. For a better understanding of the monumental event spend Wednesday nights in Jack Bullock's World War II history class.

A number of new courses are included on the schedule this semester, as well as the old familiar stand-bys. The college is anxious to serve the community and welcomes anyone to come in and inquire about the programs.



NNCC Child Center registration slated

Registration for Northern Nevada Community College's Child Center is scheduled from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. next Wednesday at the center, reports the center's director, Marilee Harper.

Harper explained the child center offers six different class options to fit the varying schedules of local parents, including three classes meeting twice a week, two classes meeting three times a week and a class for three-year-olds that meets once a week.

The three-year-old class is scheduled to meet from 11:15 to 1:15 Thursday and costs \$90 a semester.

Preschool classes on the twice-aweek option are from 8:30 to 10:30 a.m. on Mondays and Wednesdays,

from 11:15 a.m. to 1:15 p.m. op Mon-

days and Wednesdays and from 11:15 a.m. to 1:15 p.m. on Tuesdays and Fridays. Cost of the twice-a-week classes are \$180 a semester.

The three-times-a-week classes will meet from 8:30 to 10:30 a.m. on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays and from 1:45 to 3:45 p.m. on Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays. Cost for these classes are \$270 a semester.

Harper said the philosophy of the NNGC Child Center is "Children learn best from hands-on experience." Working as a team, she added, the child center's staff strives to provide the best possible pre-school experience.

She invited those wanting further information to contact her at the college, 738-8493, extension 225.

The college offers a variety of oneyear certificate programs in occupational education and four two-year associate degrees.

Students planning to transfer to a university to pursue an Associate of Arts or Associate of Science degree may study toward the Associate of Applied Science degree, he noted. Students in the occupational programs also can work toward future degrees, Greenhaw added. The Associate of General Studies degree is awarded to persons who study a broad non-specialized curriculum, he explained.

The second class, School Law, taught by Foldesy, has been tentatively scheduled for 4 to 10 p.m. Fridays and 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturdays for three weekends.

Tuition, due on Wednesday, will be \$50 per graduate credit and addi-tional "delivery cost" fees will be charged all students on the first day of class. These fees will pay for teachers' "overload" salaries, travel and per diem expenses, which have been spread over the entire program, Warren explained. Right now there will be an additional charge of \$30 per credit to cover delivery costs unless more than 15 students enroll. In that event, fees will be reduced.

NNCC class registration slated Monday, Tuesday

Northern Nevada Community College registration opens Monday. The registration period is 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Monday and Tuesday, although late registration is permitted.

Complete information on registration procedures can be found in the "Fall Announcements and Course Roster" mailed to area residents.

The college expects about 2,500 students to begin registering for the fall semester next week. About half the students will enroll at Elko and the other half at the college's Winnemucca and Ely student centers and other off-campus sites.

The projection of a fall enrollment of 2,500 is a head-count figure, explains Charles Greenhaw, dean of in-struction. He said the full-timeequated (FTE) enrollment is expected to be between 675 and 700. The FTE is derived by dividing the total number of credits students register for by 15, the benchmark student-credit load used by the Uni-versity of Nevada System to define a full-time student.

Included in the college's fall enrollment will be:

An expanded nursing program with 26 students at Elko and Ely.

· A mechanical technology program supported by mining companies and equipment vendors with 32 stu-

cation program to prepare students tions on writing a short novel, script for entry into freshman classes. for entry into freshman classes.

"Early studies" students from

Elko and Wells High School who will enroll in college composition, history and music courses. About 75 are anticipated.

Many NNCC students will follow a national trend by enrolling in general education arts and science, Greenhaw said, noting the field includes courses ranging from biology to history and from psychology to

geology. These students will be pursuing associate of arts or science degrees and most will eventually complete a four year degree at a university or the University of Nevada Reno General Studies degree, which may be completed locally. Business courses will continue to be popular, the college expects.

NNCC has scheduled three special courses for persons wishing to qualify as substitute teachers for the Elko County School District. And new to this semester's schedule will be evening courses in automotive technology.

Graduating high school seniors are reminded that applications for the Mechanical Technology Training Program are due at Northern Nevada Community College by March 15

The scholarship program in diesel and mill technology is sponsored by Manpower Training Cooperative, Inc., a consortium of area mining and mining-related companies, including Newmont Gold, Barrick-Goldstrike, Dee Gold, Marlgold Mining, Pioneer Equipment, and Round Mountain Gold.

Last June, the introductory program began and 32 students were enrolled, according to Dee Gold General Manager Dave Cook. Currently 26, of the 32, are still enrolled. The students are from Elko, Carlin, Ely, Round Mountain and Winnemucca. "The program has gone well in general, and the students are gradually improving as they become more familiar with the workplace, "said Cook.

The Mechanical Technology Training Program is a two-year program of work and study, with students earning entry level wages during work sessions at the various mine sites. The sponsoring companies pay tuition and fees for the time in training at NNCC, as well as other scholar-ship monies.

Cook said he was very pleased with the current students. "These E, Ind. 3/3/9/

students have never really worked in a formal job market, and for being thrown into a new job with other experienced workers, they are doing well."

An additional twenty-five to thirty individuals will be selected for the next training session to begin in June. Cook said that the mines hope to get a large number of applicants for the program, and are looking forward to the second session.

Touch-tone phones used in NNCC fall registration

Fall registration for Northern Ne- hearing-impaired students. vada Community College courses can Aiazzi emphasized there be made via touch-tone telephone until Aug. 27, announced Stan Aiazzi, dean of students. The number is 753-2100.

New students will not be able to use the system until they have filled out basic information forms. Late registrations also may be made on campus from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Aug. 28 and 29. Late fees will be assessed at that time; fee receipts will not be mailed, but can be obtained at the college.

Valerie Easterly, NNCC director of planning and public information, said touch-tone phones make audible beeps whon numbers are nunched. If no sound is heard, the phone is a rotary and the system will not work.

To accommodate those who need assistance, "Academic Advisement Day" is slated from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. Aug. 22 in Berg Hall. Students may come to the college that day to talk with representatives from each NNCC department. They will also be given information on how class cre-dits transfer to other institutions, selecting majors, planning schedules and choosing goals.

The system, though, is unable to make schedule changes or inform students about multiple course sections. It won't register students who want to audit classes and it won't tell what prerequisites are required for courses. It is not equipped for

Aiazzi emphasized there will continue to be people available for students who feel uncomfortable with the new system. "NNCC is actually the last of Nevada's two universities and four community colleges to implement centralized computing, but the University of Nevada system is one of the first educational institutions in the country to be so equipped."

Nevada's program is called Student Information Systems (SIS) and contains the records of students in all six state institutions.

Aiazzi and Madeline Ashworth, manager of data processing services, started training a year and a half ago. They spent a semester setting up 800 data bank "tables" for NNCC's registration process, including the records of all students enrolled at the school since its inception more than 20 years ago.

"We tried out the phones the first time May 1 for summer registration, Aiazzi noted. "It worked beautifully,

With the new system, Aiazzi explained, students will have more time to register. The class schedule, which is slated to be mailed soon, is available at NNCC

Joyce Shaw, NNCC graphic desig-

ner and writer, suggests students have alternate classes planned be-

fore dialing.

A work sheet will be included with the schedules so students can prepare for questions the automatic voice will ask. The work sheet will have instructions for registering, but information also is available at NNCC Student Services between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. five days a week. The number is 738-8493.

Fees must be paid by 5 p.m. on the last day of registration; a "drop box" will be provided at the college. No bills will be sent except for underpayments; overpayments dropped-class fees will be refunded almost immediately

If payment is not received on time, enrollments will be "purged" from the system, Aiazzi warned.

In the future, the computer will be used for other things at NNCC. For example, a degree-audit system will permit students to find out how close they are to graduation and what classes will be required if majors should be changed. He said the computer can also "track" alumni and take orders for transcripts.

The computerization of the financial aid department is being worked on by Ashworth and department chairman Joan Williams. When it is complete, students will be able to come into the financial aid office to find out about federal grants, awards or other assistance.

Touch registration, according to Dean of Students, Stan Aiazzi, is possible from any touch tone phone. Registration is open from July 1st through August 27th for fall semester. The idea behind this change is to make registration convenient for students who live outside of the Elko area and for those who cannot get away from work to register

Students new to NNCC will still have to register in person. Aiazzi said, "Brand new students will have to come in and fill out a form so that we can get them into the computer. Once they are in the computer, they can register by phone," said Aiazzi.

Touch registration is a simple

process for those with class schedules and touch-tone phones. "Rotary phones won't work with this system," Aiazzi explained. A touch-tone phone is one with a keypad that makes a single tone for each key pressed. All pay phones are touch-tone. Aiazzi said there will be a bank of phones in the NNCC Berg Hall lobby for registration use.

Class schedules which centain complete touch registration instructions will be mailed out early next week. Class credit hour fees have increased from \$24 to \$26 per credit. Students are encouraged to complete the touch registration worksheet prior to

standing in endless lines, students call, it follows the same sequence of questions they will be asked by the computer," said Aiazzi. Touch registration is available

Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Saturday from noon to 10 p.m. and Sunday noon to 6 p.m. until August 27th. After August 27th, late registration must be done in person, and there is a \$5 per day late fee. Late registration will only be available August 28 and 29th from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Classes begin the week of September 3rd. After registration closes, any class cancellations will be posted at NNCC and will appear on the Elko Channel, which is 32 on Elko's cable system.

For students who need to see an advisor about their schedules prior to registering, an advisement day will be provided on August 22nd in Berg Hall. "We will have representatives from each of the instructional areas in room 7 of Berg Hall to advise students," said Alazzi. Some of the information which

the registration worksheet asks for includes, student's social security number, birth date, class 5 digit numbers, and total fees. Students must pay for their classes by 5 p.m. on August 27th, or their schedules will be remov-



The touch system will not: accept changes, check for open sections, check for prerequisites, list fees owed, allow special class registration, allow registration for more than 18 credit hours without permission, register students for zero credit community service classes, allow students to register who are on financial, academic, or administrative hold. For any of these situations, or if students receive financial aid, they must contact the office of Student Services before attempting to register.

Alazzi said the touch system is a simple and convenient way to register, but if any problems occur, students should call 738-8493 for assistance. The schedule will provide specific instructions on the touch system, as well as a complete catalog of classes of-

fered, added Aiazzi.



A workshop for health care professionals who want to learn behavioral strategies and clinical skills that help to moderate and divert workrelated stress has been slated for

The workshop is worth four units of continuing education for nurses, Kimber said. Credit for EMT's, respiratory therapists, dieticians, social workers and nursing assistants is pending, she added.





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NNCC paper-making course date changed



Health Career Courses In Progress At NNCC

Shoshone classes will be taught during this summer session for credit at the Northern Nevada Community College at 901 Elm. This will be a two-credit class. Registration will be held during the scheduled time. Financial aid could be available for classes but you need to complete your paperwork ahead of time. Did you know a high school diploma is not absolutely necessary to attend college classes? You may take a certain amount of classes and complete them before you will be required to complete your high school diploma. This is called the "open door policy" and allows adults to gain confidence, take classes so that in the future, college and university learning will not be a frightening experience.

Also, did you know there are adult learning classes available at NNCC that do not cost any money except for the text when you are ready? The books used at the college are free and the tutoring needed to gain your GED or high school diploma are free, too. What a good deal. The hours are flexible to meet you schedule — there are both night and day hours. Ask your education person about this or if you are shy, I would be happy to introduce you to the college person you need to see.

Also, Lori, wife of Rocky Roa, works in the Employment Office. She is helpful in completing paperwork for young people who would like to continue their training out of the area.

Tutors are available at the college for most subjects. There is a

resource room where you can ask for additional help. But, if you would like a certain tutor, this can be arranged through Richard McNalley. For those of you who are exceptionally bright in certain college subjects, you might want to tutor another Native American. This concept of helping another Native American would not only assist the student in the classwork but would serve a two-fold purpose: First, the classroom work; and second, the development of positive self-esteem. 



The course will provide four contact hours of continuing education


credit for nurses and 3.4 contact hours for social workers.

Mining scholarship winners begin two-year work-study

Thirty-two students from rural Nevada high schools began work this week after receiving scholarships for two years of work-study in miningrelated fields.

The scholarships, sponsored by several area mining companies and mining-related suppliers, will include on-the-job training at various minesites as well as classroom work at Northern Nevada Community College. Students will study and work with welding, hydraulics and diesel equipment. Studies will cover core courses such as math, English and

computers. Upon completion of the two years of work-study, each student will have a certificate in a miningrelated fields. With extra study, a student in the program could obtain an associate degree in science or arts from the college.

The two-year scholarship is worth about \$10,000 and will cover tuition, books, lab fees and living expenses. In addition, students will earn about \$35,000 each during their workstudy employment over two summers and during the school year. Employment will be at prevailing wages at the

various minesites and shops in Elko, Eureka, Nye and Humboldt counties.

This program is sponsored by Manpower Training Co-operative, a nonprofit corporation formed to establish the scholarship program.
Participating companies include
Newmont Gold Company of Elko;
Barrick Goldstrike Mine of Elko; Tricon Metals of Elko; Pinson Mining Company of Winnemucca; Marigold Mining Company of Valmy; Round Mountain Gold Corporation of Round Mountain; Pioneer Equipment Co. of Elko; and Dee Gold Mining Company of Elko. Each company sponsors a certain number of students and offers summer and co-op employment during the program. Upon completion, each student will be offered fulltime employment as a mechanic or technician at one of the sponsoring companies.

Thirteen students from Elko High School were selected for the program, four from Carlin, five from Ely, three from Battle Mountain, one from Austin, four from Tonopah and two from Winnemucca.

This program is made possible by the efforts of NNCC administration and staff members, who have worked for the past several years to develop training and degree programs to benefit industries in northern Nevada. Newmont Gold has assisted with instructors' salaries and equipment. Barrick Goldstrike and several other companies have provided needed technical equipment and supplies. Both Newmont and Barrick have sponsored more than 80 of their present employees to receive intensive classroom and shop courses in various mechanical fields through NNCC programs. EDFP 4-23-90

NNCC now offering mine safety classes

Courses designed to meet the federal government's requirement for mine safety training are being offered in the newly formed Training Compliance Program at the Northern Nevada Community College.

Harold Baugh, hired by the college to set up the program, said NNCC now has courses for new miners; newly hired, experienced miners; and annual refresher courses for mine employees. The college also will be able to certify trainers for a company, so that trainer can go on to instruct the safety courses at his mine, Baugh said.

Baugh said the courses are scheduled as needed, with instructors working odd hours to accommodate students.


The initial course for an inexperienced miner runs 24 hours; the re-E.O.F.P 7/3/90 fresher courses run eight hours.

In addition to miners, Mine Safety and Health Act regulations require some mine suppliers take the courses as well, Baugh said. He explained that a vending machine repairman working in a mine truck shop is exposed to the same hazards as the mining company employees working in the same shop.

Baugh, a former Newmont Gold Company employee, said several of the larger mines have their own training programs to satisfy federal requirements, but those mines have sent notice to suppliers and contract employees that they will need a training certificate to work at the mine site.

A regular schedule of classes, as well as seminars on various rules and regulations, will be developed in the future, Baugh said. NNCC Dressage and Jumping clinic will be held at the Spring Creek Horse Palace July 31 and August 1. Evening sessions are available. able. The draft regulations have established standards for education, experience, performance and financial responsibility required for the certification of consultants and contractors and have established requirements for anyone responsible for a spill, leak, or accident.

Activities covered in the regulations include -

- · Hazardous waste management
- Solid waste management
- Site or property investigation

- Environmental remediation

During the presentation, NNCC Foundation Chairman Jeanne Blach informed the audience of how money was raised for the building project through various donations.


Blach told how the efforts of Paul

Sibling relationships are important factors in the emotional development of the individual—and sibling position patterns can be a revealing compotent of roles taken later in life. As each child is born into a family, a new and unique environment emerges. The child receives messages about role assignments, self-esteem, and perceptual orientation. These patterns are observable, describable, and often useful in the theraputic process.

EDFP 11/1/90 Working stock dog clinic recent success for NNCC

A dozen dogs — almost all of them border collies — were enrolled last weekend in Northern Nevada Community College's first clinic aimed at helping people train their stock dogs. About 30 ranchers and other inter-ested dog owners who requested the class attended the clinic conducted by Jo Woodbury of Star, Idaho.

Woodbury demonstrated how dogs should work on either cattle or sheep by using her own "Craig" and "Sadie" to "dog break" a band of sheep rented from a Ruby Valley

are told and "stay" until their handlers release them by saying "that'll do" or a similar, unmistakable command.

Woodbury was equipped with a shepherd's staff, a whistle and a long, light cord attached to each pup's collar when she introduced each dog to the small band of sheep. Sheep are less intimidating to start on for young dogs than a herd of

As they began to work, they

learned additional commands such as "go by" (go to the left flank of the flock) "way to me" (right flank) and "there" (stop but don't lie down.)

An outdoor, round corral proved best for the work because sheep couldn't crowd into corners. The level of each dog's herding instinct became immediately apparent and after three works each in two days, all canine students and their helpers made great strides.

"Sadie" to "dog break" a band of sheep rented from a Ruby Valley rancher to use for puppy-educational purposes. She explained the commands each dog would need to obey before they began learning about, moving stock.

To be of any use, dogs must "come" when they are called, get "down" on their bellies when they are told and "stay" until their handangly tone out of your voice and why a whistle is useful. Whistles don't disclose emotion."

disclose emotion.

The only discipline administered at the clinic consisted of quick, light jerks on drawing cords, which really, amounted one to explaining to the dogs what was wanted by the handler.

The long staff was dropped in front of the pupils, this tunning handler to slow the dog or change his direction. None seemed intimidated by the pole.

Woodbury described three escalating disciplinary procedures she uses for overt disobedience: The first is grabbing the puppy's head below his

for overt disobedience: The first is grabbing the puppy's head below his ears, getting on his level and looking into his eyes, pinching one ear and scolding. The second is grabbing the hair under his ears, lifting his front feet off the Ground shaking him slightly and solding. The third is


lifting all four feet off the ground, looking him in the face and scolding angrily before tying him up for 24 hours. During that time he is not spoken to no matter how much he wags his tail. She says the last treatment will make a believer out of any border collie.

In Idaho, sheep dog trials are becoming a popular sport, Woodbury says. A well-trained dog older than three years but younger than eight can bring as much as \$2,500. She sells registered border collie pups for \$250 and up.
