Lab tech program to start at Elko college

A medical laboratory technician program is slated to begin in Sep-tember at Northern Nevada Community College. Gloria Everett will be the program director.

The college is offering the program in conjunction with the University of Nevada at Reno School of Medicine. The university will provide special-ized lecture courses and the clinical rotations will be the responsibility of the NNCC Health Sciences Division.

Everett said, "The program includes extensive classroom and laboratory work and incorporates practical experiences in affiliated laboratories. The courses are designed to prepare students for diverse activities in Nevada hospitals, laboratories and clinics. Our program will prepare students with a sound, medically oriented base for expansion to closely related fields.

"The first two years of study provide the student with the necessary technical skills. Our course curriculum includes medical laboratory

principles, instrumentation, clinical chemistry, hematology, immunology, microbiology, parasitology and clincial practicum.

Everett said she will instruct most of the classes and students will attend lecture courses broadcast from UNR via the school's new "smart technology" teleconferencing system. Students completing the two-year

program will receive an Associate of Applied Science degree and are eligible to take the medical laboratory technician national certificate exam or pursue a baccalaureate degree at UNR.

Everett was formerly the manager of the clinical lab at Elko General Hospital. She is certified as a registered medical technologist and a member of the American Society of Medical Technology. She is a graduate of Carroll College in Helena, Mont



Community College Teachers Organize

Northern Nevada Community College teachers are organizing for better representation-but not necessarily union representation -in answer to what some have outlined as inequity in the Nevada higher education system.

"We're very optimistic here," says NNCC Faculty President Mike McFarlane, "We have a new president and his main pri-ority is to work with the faculty." McFarlane, Physical Sciences

41

instructor at NNCC, explained that teachers at the Elko facility are joining with instructors in the state's three other community colleges in protesting what they see as salary inequities between college and university faculty, and-in some cases-inequities between college salaries themselves. Instructors involved in the move also decry a lack of communication with administrators, and difficulties for students to transfer courses from college to university levels.

McFarlane noted that NNCC faculty, both full and part-time instructors, are the lowest paid teachers in both the college and university system.

"We are significantly behind in pay scale," he said, "And that's been hard to understand."

The faculty president also represents the Elko campus as a member of the Community College Faculty Relations Committee, an ad hoc committee of the Board of Regents, that is scheduled to meet Thursday with regents to discuss recommendations resulting from a recent teacher sur-

The regents are reportedly anxious to head off any unionization effort and, according to one member, "It is the absolute top priority of this board that these problems be straightened out." Currently, McFarlane said,

Nevada's community colleges are developing a collective bargaining agreement to address labor issues, a plan that was approved by regents last April and is sched-uled to be voted upon in January.

McFariane said new policies are being formulated in Elko as a result of the committee meeting. "We're working now on the

shared governance concept," an idea designed to allow faculty members to become more involved in the functioning of the Board of Regents and school administration. McFarlane described the concept as "a method of strengthening the current system."



Heaton-Lamp new director of single-parent program

Debbie Heaton-Lamp is the new director of the Northern Nevada Community College Single-Parent Program, reports NNCC publicist Julie Duewel.

Heaton-Lamp, who replaced Georgia Hemsley, received a bachelor's degree in nursing from Washington State University and a master's degree in counseling from the University of Nevada Reno.

"I see single-parent problems as a societal problem," explains Heaton-Lamp, who recently moved to Elko. "Extra resources are needed to enable these families to live above the poverty level, and the singleparent program is a shining example of a way to accomplish this."

The program is federally funded through grants and helps single parents gain education and job skills. If parents qualify, NNCC offers them free tuition, books, and child care for approximatley one year. NNCC also assists parents in receiving other financial help such as Pell Grants and scholarships.

"A lot of the single-parent program is counseling parents both personally and with their careers, and to support them as they go to school and deal with every day life situations," says Heaton-Lamp, whose background includes providing counseling services in Reno through UNR and working as a school nurse for six years in the Washoe County School District.

Heaton-Lamp and employees Ike Cress, Marty Myers and Barbara Gonzales work closely and exchange helpful information with other services available in the community such as Nevada Department of Human Resources (JOIN), the Te-Moak Tribe of Western Shoshone, Vocational Rehabilitation, and the Employment Security Department, Duewel said.

The single-parent program also conducts vocational testing that allows students to determine what professions they may want to pursue. In addition, the program provides standardized tests to determine student's math, reading and competency levels. If needed, NNCC also offers tutoring and extra classes.

One of Heaton-Lamp's goals is to expand the program. "We want to encourage others to apply for the program," she says, adding, "it's important to note that the singleparent program is not limited to women."

There are currently 41 students in the program from Elko, Carlin, Wells, Ely, Wendover and Winnemucca, and 40 in a sister program, Youth At Risk, directed by Pat Collins.

"Youth at Risk helps young people land on their feet by providing career and personal counseling, vocational training, work experience and financial assistance to anyone who does not have a GED or high school diploma," explains Collins. "The program also assists high school students who may need help graduating.

"In Nevada, the high school dropout rate averages 25 percent, meaning one out of four students drops out."

"We're trying to reach those students having trouble in school, "Heaton-Lamp says, "and encourage them to stay in school and graduate."

Both Collins and Heaton-Lamp agree the biggest benefit of both NNCC programs is building selfesteem, confidence and hope in people so they can go on to support themselves and their families.

Concurrent workshops were held during the several day meeting on Adult Basic Education, English as a

Second Language and Adult Education on both community college and university levels.

Continuing education doesn't focus on degree programs, Warren explains, but is concerened with all kinds of adult education including providing course work for teachers, doctors, lawyers and others who need constant study to keep their licenses current.

Another facet of continuing education is "workplace literacy." Ferry explains that NNCC is in the second year of a reading program taught at NNCC by teacher Maria Toledo for Hispanics. It is sponsored by the college and the Southern Pacific Railroad.

By January, he says, NNCC will be conducting a reading course in Wendover specifically for Hispanic employees of the Peppermill Inn and Casino, co-sponsor of the program with NNCC.

Warren said other similar programs are in progress for Cactus Pete's Casino in Wendover and at Newmont Gold Company.





NNCC pre-nursing to start

With the anticipation of starting a nursing program available to White Pine County residents in 1990, the Northern Nevada Community College of Ely has announced its prenursing classes.

This fall the Ely center is offering eight classes to fulfill the requirements which are pre-requisites for the actual clinical nursing program. The scheduled classes include anatomy and physiology. nutrition, psychology, sociology,

English 101, humanities and intermediate algebra. Constitutional government and elementary algebra also are being offered through selfpaced telecourse.

Students who are not interested in a nursing degree, however, may enroll in any of the courses for their own knowledge.

Anatomy and physiology is a class designed to teach facts about the body. According to experts in these fields, human hearts beat about 72 times each minute without any conscious effort. During their lifetimes, most people will digest about 60 thousand pounds of food, which is equal to six elephants. People also breathe 3,300 gallons of air a day, while their bodies heal and protect themselves. There are 206 bones in the human body and 656 muscles. More than 200 of them are involved when a person takes one step.

By the time it took readers to

read the previous paragraph, their bodies would have replaced millions of cells.

In anatomy and physiology students also are slated to learn about the cell. Each person consists of some hundred trillion cells, yet began life as one single cell. Sudents will learn about genes and how eye color is determined. The blood and bones lecture usually coincides with Halloween.

At d students will travel through the 62,000 miles of the human circulatory system, and examine what makes humans special - the brain.

Human anatomy and physiology is taught by Gerald Miller every Tuesday night. Lab times will be announced.

English 101 (the first semester of basic college English) will prepare students for college level writing and reading.

The proposed text book-reader is designed to acquaint students with the kinds of reading, writing and thinking skills they will need to master in order to communicate in all subjects across the college curriculum.

During the semester, students should be able to practice three essential college-level skills: To read and summarize an article (or story, report, essay, and so on); To read several articles on a particular topic and synthesize them according to one or more rhetorical schemes; and To read an article and write a critique of it, identifying and discussing the author's (and their own) assumptions.

This course has been designed to not only enhance the basic skills of reading and writing, but to demonstrate that all students can learn to read and write effectively and

enjoyably. The psychology course will bridge the gap between outer space and inner space, the greatest challenge for people. The instructor plans to delve into the immensity of the human mind with this first study of behavior. Topics include biological bases of behavior, perception, learning, motivation, memory, cognitive development, social and personality and psychology, abnormal behavior and psycopatholgy.

Psychology is taught every Thursday from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. by Jorinda Macgillivray.

Julie Gonzalez is slated to teach the elementary algebra class to allow students who have been out of school for a period of time to catch up on their algebra skills. This elementary course is intended for those who didn't take, or didn't understand, or don't remember high school algebra.

The course will cover the fundamental operations of natural numbers, integers, first-degree equations, and inequalities in one variable, products and factors, fractions and rational equations, graphs and linear systems, work problems, radical and quadratic equations.

The course is intended to provide a basic foundation for future mathematics needed in fields of business, economics, engineering and related fields.

New Medical Tech Program

Grant funds have made it possible for the School of Medicine to bring a two-year medical technology degree program to Northern Nevada Community College in the fall of 1991.

The program, offered jointly by The University of Nevada School of Medicine Clinical Laboratory Sciences program and NNCC, is similar to an ongoing program at Clark County Community College In Las Vegas. Lectures are provided by the School of Medicine program faculty, and the community college provides the labs and clinical rotations.

Dr. Ken Maehara, director of

the clinical lab science department, said both programs will be upgraded with the addition of a computer network system that will allow the live transmission of slides and lecture. With the new system, students in Elko will be seeing the same thing students in Reno will see.

College (NNCC) announces its new Medical Laboratory Technician (MLT) program, which begins this September. The MLT is offered jointly by the University of Nevada School of Medicine and NNCC. The school of Medicine provides specialized lecture courses, and clinical rota-tions are provided by the NNCC Health Sciences Division.



According to Gloria Everett, program director, "...the program includes extensive classroom and laboratory work, and incorporates practical exaffiliated periences in affiliated laboratories." Everett also said "The courses are designed to prepare students for diverse ac-tivities in Nevada hospitals, laboratories, and clinics. Our program will prepare students with a sound, medically-oriented base for expansion to closely related fields.

"The first two years of study provide the student with the necessary technical skills," says Ms. Everett. "Our course curriculum includes Medical Laboratory Principles, In-

Chemistry, Hematology, Im-munology, Microbiology, Parasitology, and Clinical Prac-ticum. I will be th instructor for most courses, and students will attend specialized lecture courses broadcast from UNR via our new "SMART TECHNOLOGY" teleconferencing system. Students completing the two-year

program in Elko receive an Associate of Applied Science and are eligible to take the medical laboratory technician national certificate exam. Students may then also elect to pursue a baccalaureate degree at UNR."





Rhoads bill would provide matching funds for NNCC

State Senator Dean Rhoads of Elko County has introduced a bill that would make slot machine tax money available on a matching basis for community college capital improvement projects, including one in progess at Elko.

Rhoads said SB514, which has been referred to the Senate Finance Committee in Carson City, would create a fund making \$500,000 per year available for the retirement of bonds

Island Lake site for class

Northern Nevada Community College has scheduled a one-credit summer class on the history of wildflowers and insects at Island Lake. The lake drains into Lamoille Canyon.

According to Mark Ports, NNCC biology instructor, class members will study flowers and insects of the Ruby Mountains through the use of slides, specimens and a field trip.

Class will be held from 7 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. July 16 and 18. The field trip is scheduled for July 20; the daylong trip will include a two-mile hike from Lamoille Canyon to Island Lake.

The course is designed for anyone interested in the history of the Ruby Mountains, Ports stated. The class is approved for recertification credit for teachers.

Anyone interested in registering may enroll at the Student Services office, located in Berg Hall at NNCC. E O, F, P = 7/6 - 9/1 issued to finance building projects at community colleges throughout the state. The "matching-fund" language in the bill anticipates that half the cost of eligible projects would be paid by private contributions.

Jeanne Blach, director of the Northern Nevada Community College Foundation in Elko, said today provisions of Rhoads' bill would make the foundation's community center project at NNCC eligible for matching funds. That would mean, she explained, that the foundation could move ahead with the project's second phase, which will add a 250-seat theater to the building now under construction.

Blach said the NNCC Foundation has raised \$2 million in private donations, and the bill now before the legislature would make another \$2 million available for the project in Elko. The first phase of the project, now being built, is budgeted at \$1.3 million.

Rhoads said he expects a hearing on SB514 will be conducted within the next two weeks.

It would make the \$500,000 per year available from the proceeds of a tax levied by the state against slot machines. Revenue from this levy finances several university and school projects, but growth in the yield of the tax has created a flow of money greater than existing obligations, Rhoads explained. This surplus revenue from the tax would provide the matching funds for community college projects.

Rhoads said about \$200,000 per year would be sufficient to amortize a \$2 million bond to match the private donations already collected in Elko.

Enabling clauses in SB514 designed to render the NNCC project eligible for matching funds provide that "...any donation of money made EOFP SIMPS.

before July 1, 1991, may be included in determining the amount of money donated to defray the cost of a project," and "...money from the capital construction fund for community colleges may be used to defray the cost of a project commenced before July 1, 1991."

1, 1991." The initial phase of the Elko project, now abuilding, will provide a dining room, game room, social room, study room, foundation offices, a bookstore and a main foyer that will feature a fountain.

at the close of the ceremony.


UP donates to college

Public radio station almost ready to air

Public radio is coming to Elko. KNCC, as the new station will be called, should begin broadcasting in May, said District Attorney Marshall Smith, who is in charge of establishing the station. When the station will go on the air depends on when vol-unteers will be able to install an antenna on Elko Mountain, he

explained. The station, which will be heard on 91.5 FM, will originally broadcast the signal of Reno's public radio sta-tion, KUNR. Smith hopes to start broadcasting local news and classi-cal, jazz and folk music this summer, but that depends on when construction of the new building at Northern Nevada Community College, where the station will be housed, is completed, he said. The building is scheduled to be completed in mid-July.

Since it is a public radio station, there will be no commercials, said Smith. Funds will be raised through corporate sponsors, membership drives, auctions and other methods. Carl Diekhans, NNCC dean of col-

lege services, said it will cost a mini-mum of \$20,000 a year to keep the station running. He added that vol-unteers decided to name the station KNCC because those that grouping of-letters had "a ring to it" and KNNC didn't.

Public radio was the one thing Smith said he missed since he moved from Sacramento, Calif., in 1988. He said he saw a need for the station here.

"Public radio is dependent on people interested in a commercial-free source of news and information, and public and cultural events," Smith said.

Volunteers have begun placing posters that read "It's Coming" around town. Posters with more information will be put up in about three weeks, Smith said.

A meeting has been scheduled for 7 p.m. April 30 at the county library for people interested in volunteer-ing. More information is available at 738-8493.

Elko will soon have it's own public radio station, according to Marshall Smith, of Elko, who has been appointed to oversee the initial operation of the radio station. Dr. Ron Remington of Northern Nevada Community College ap-pointed Smith in February to this position.


The commercial free FM station will broadcast nationally acclaimed and award winning news programs such as All Things considered and Morning Edition along with local news and information. "I am excited about the capability we will have to broadcast comprehensive news and information stories which are taking place right here in Elko in ad-dition to state, national, and international stories" said Smith, in a prepared statement. The station will also broadcast a variety of programing ranging from classical, jazz, and folk music.

The station will be housed at the Northern Nevada Community College in Elko. The station is licensed with the Federal Communication Commission to broadcast on 91.5 FM with the call let-ters "KNCC." Although housed at the community college, "the station will be independent of the college and operated by a not-forprofit corporation, known as Friends of KNCC," said Smith.

KNCC will operate as an associate station of KUNR Public Radio station located on the campus of the University of Nevada, Reno. "Initially, we will broad-cast 100% of KUNR signal, until we are ready to originate and broadcast our own signal...We anticipate going on air with KUNR signal as early as May 1991 with local origination beginning sometime this summer" said Smith. "Last November several of the project volunteers poured the cement foundation for the tower on Elko Mountain. We are waiting for the weather to clear to complete the installation project' according to Smith. "Public Radio must have two
