

Financial aid assistance available at GBC


ELKO - High school seniors and their parents can get help with financial aid applications Jan. 29 during College Goal Sunday, Great Basin College will host a seminar to help students complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid paperwork and to advise them about ways to make college affordable. The seminar will begin at 2 p.m. in the High Tech Center.

The FAFSA application is used to determine students' and their parents' expected contributions and how much money they are eligible to receive toward their education. Financial aid can come in the form of need-based grants and federally backed student loans.

Students should apply for a personal identification number to fill out the FAFSA application in advance by visiting www.pin.ed.gov, but students can also fill out a paper application at the sites.

Students under 23 years old should bring their parents, along with a copy of their 2005 income tax information for both student and parents. Students 24 years or older need only their own tax information.




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

ELKO — The Great Basin College class of 2006, which includes 255 graduates, will graduate in a ceremony at 4 p.m. Friday in the Elko Convention Center.

GBC President Paul Killpatrick will preside over the graduation. Former GBC education professor Dr. Nancy Remington of Elko will be the commencement speaker. Numerous regents will be in attendance as well.

Several-honorary degrees are also being conferred.

An honorary Bachelor of Arts degree will be awarded to Al Huber of Jackpot. Huber is a longtime supporter of Great Basin College, and provided much of the energy during the college's founding days.

Todd Hellman will be honored posthumously. Hellman was enrolled in the college's nursing program and working as a flight nurse for Access Air. He and three others were killed when their ship went down during a snowstorm as they were transporting a victim to the hospital. He will also receive an honorary Bachelor of Arts degree.

GBC also honors citizens for their


Community Service honorees are Wes Bolen of Wells, and Wes and Sue Dixon of rural Elko County. All three have been instrumental in the advancement of the college's programs and facilities.

.Forty-four of the graduates will be receiving bachelor of arts degrees, up 33 percent from last year. Twenty-two will receive a bachelor of applied science degree, up nearly 15 percent from last year. Sixty-seven will receive an associate of arts degree, up more than 25 percent from last year. Fifteen will receive an associate of science degree, a 150 percent increase from last year. Twenty will receive an associate of general studies, nearly 50 percent more than last year.

Twenty students will receive certificates of completion in a variety of areas, up by nearly 40 percent

from last year.

Sixty-seven students earned their associate of applied science degrees, which was a decline. GBC officials attribute the decline to the booming mining industry, which has drawn in many potential students.

ELKO — Tom Merwin and Korri Ward, leaders of the Northern Nevada Autism Network, attended the two-day Nevada Autism Summit in November, representing rural Nevadans affected by autism. The NAS is a yearlong project of the University Center for Excellence in Disabilities.

At the Summit Merwin and Ward participated in writing recommendations for the NAS position statement and action plan to address current and future needs of Nevadans with autism and their families.

To best meet the needs of rural Nevada's affected by autism NNAN is asking families and service providers to tell their story about diagnosis and intervention in NAS survey http://repc.unr.edu/NAS/

The goal of Northern Nevada Autism Network is to improve the lives of all affected by autism. It is committed to promoting public awareness about autism and how it affects individuals, families and society.

Autism does not discriminate. It can affect any child, any family, no matter the level of education, family income, race, ethnicity, or social status. To date, there is no known cause and no cure.

NNAN strives to give hope to all who are dealing with the hardships of autism. Its aim is to bring the Elko autism community together to urge our government and the private

sector to listen to our concerns and take action to meet the needs of the families affected by autism.

NNAN was founded in April 2005 by parents of children with autism. At monthly meetings the organization provides an opportunity for parents to meet others with similar needs and concerns. There are frequent guest speakers to discuss evidenced-based best practices and available services.


"Nurses are in short supply, especially in rural Nevada," Puccinelli said. "The auxiliary's generosity helps to assure first rate health care for the entire community."



New program allows students to study on GBC campuses

RENO — The University of Nevada, Reno, and Great Basin College have teamed up to offer a "3 + 1" bachelor of social work degree in Elko.

According to GBC Professor Patrick O'Hanahan, wireless networking for personal computers is not a new idea. "It's been around for a few years. But the emergence of standardized equipment and the continuing decrease in cost of the equipment

has generated quite an explosion in wireless networks. One of the most appealing and misleading ideas about wireless networking is the ease of setting up a network."

O'Hanahan explained that in many cases it easy to set up a network, but once the network has been established, "certain network demons may be awakened."

This course is divided into three separate one credit class units. Class one is for the home user, or anyone requiring basic information about wireless networking. Students will examine networking in general, and the equipment required when going wireless, choosing the right technology, and setting up and configuring the network.

The second class in the sequence explores ways of connecting to different networks away from home on business, at school, or on vacation. Class three is aimed at small business operations wishing to install a secure wireless network for the work place.

"We will also review ways for the small business to offer a wireless network to their customers and at the same time keep it relatively secure," O'Hanahan said.

It is delivered online and taught by local school district instructors with the Driver's Education endorsement. The course is open to students in Elko, Eureka, Lander, Humboldt and White Pine counties.

To be eligible for the course, students must be at least 15% by the end of the course. High school students get a special \$35 tuition fee. If a student has not been enrolled at GBC in the past, a \$10 admission fee will also apply.

A benefit of the course is that it cuts the amount of training the Department of Motor Vehicles requires of student drivers by one-half.

VITH THE ENVIRONMENT

ELKO — A new literature class at Great Basin College is getting students to re-assess the environment they live in.

The class, English 223 Themes of Literature, is covering environmental literature this semester. The course instructor, Susanne Bentley, uses environmental writings and lots of classroom discussion to get her students to better understand the natural environment around them.

"The idea of teaching literature about the environment is a really new concept," Bentley said. "This is on the cutting edge. These writers are helping us look at it in a personal way.

For GBC students like Sydna Hammond, who is studying to become a nurse, the class already has given her a new perspective on the importance of conservation. She said she has lately been doing little things around her house to save energy, like turning lights off behind her and making sure that faucets aren't running.

At GBC, the Themes of Literature

course switches topics from semester it is not done in a "preachy" way. to semester. Bentley brought this semester's environmental literature concept to GBC from a course she studied at the University of Nevada-Reno. The influence of that UNR class is evident from Bentley's textbook, which was co-written by her literature professor from UNR.

About 18 students are currently enrolled in the class - including students at satelite campuses in Battle Mountain and Ely that participate via video conferencing. Authors in the main textbook for the class include Aldo Leopold, Barbara Kingsolver and John Muir. Students also select novels to read through the semester and keep journals where they write their thoughts about the literature and topics in the class.

One of the recent assignments for the class asked students to come up with ideas that they could apply in Elko to help improve the environment in our area. Some of the ideas included encouraging recycling programs in Elko, carpooling and making young people more environmentally conscious.

While the course addresses environmental problems, students said

"When we walked in, some of us were thinking, 'Ugh! Environment! Radicals! ... but that is not what it was," said Debbie Boundy, a student in the class who is studying to be an elementary teacher.

Others agreed.


"It is not condemning anybody, it is just saying, 'pay attention," said Tiffany Williams, a student in the class who is studying to be a secondary teacher.


Most of the students in the environment class are studying to become elementary or secondary teachers. Several students said they hope to integrate what they learned into their future classrooms.


"We can teach them how they can become aware of the environment and have respect for the land," Boundy said.

The classes included in the Bilin-

The Bilingual Front Office Program is designed to cover basic office skills. Reyes said GBC also offers a more advanced office training program for bilingual students. Students who complete the advanced program receive an interpreter and translator certificate of achievement. Reyes said the interpreter program gives more intense training in both languages in both reading and writing.


The nursing assistant course provides students with the classroom, laboratory and clinical experience to make them eligible to take to the state certified nursing

Social work program helps fill need

ELKO - As the need for new social workers grows in northeastern Nevada, Great Basin College and the University of Nevada, Reno, have been preparing local students to help fill the gap, through a "3 + 1" bachelor of social work degree program,

Students in the program complete their first three years of classes in social work at GBC. They then transfer their credits to UNR, but continue their final year of studies at northeastern Nevada campuses through a combination of live courses taught by adjunct faculty and interactive video courses taught by professors in Reno.

The program is helping aspiring social workers finish their degrees locally and continue their careers in northeastern Nevada, Before the advent of the new program. these students would have to transfer to a larger campus to complete their degree increasing the likelihood that they would not return to northeastern Nevada to work in social services.

"The reason why they started this is because there is a need and has been a need - for social workers in rural Nevada in agencies like child protective services. aging services, welfare and other nonprofit agencies," said Wendy Charlebois, a social work instructor at GBC. "We would like to keep the talent within our own communities. ... It is a way for people to fulfill a dream they've had to help others without having to leave their community."

With Elko poised for new growth and much of the state work force retiring within the next few years, Charlebois said she expects an increased need for social workers in northeastern Nevada. Charlebois said this program will help meet that need.

In addition to their course work. students in GBC's new social work program complete internships in

northeastern Nevada. Charlebois said agencies in Elko, Elv. Winnemucca and Owyhee have been very responsive to having local students placed with them. Already, students in the program have interned with aging services. hospitals and other facilities Charlebois said this experience further helps the students address issues that are unique to rural

communities

"Oftentimes, in rural Nevada you have to put on your creative thinking cap and work with what you have," Charlebois said.

There are 11 students currently participating in GBC's new "3 + 1" social work program, which began this past fall. The program's first graduates will receive their degrees this May. At one of

Charlebois' social work classes this month, all of the students said they hope to continue their careers in northeastern Nevada. Many said the program has helped facilitate that plan.

"If they would not have gotten the '3 + 1' program at GBC, it would not have been easy to get a degree in social work because of the distance to travel to UNR." said Joyce Hulet, a student in the class. "I'm just really glad they brought it here. It is helping me get my education faster."

Another student, Pam Sheets, said the program benefits everyone involved.


"It is a win for us and it is a win for the community because they need us and we all plan to work here and get back to the community," Sheets said.

Charlebois said she sees potential for the program to grow. The reach of the program may soon extend to southern Nevada, where GBC is expected to assume administration of the Pahrump Valley Center this July.

"That is one place I could see the social work program going because they have had a hard time recruiting social workers in Pahrump," Charlebois said.

Thanks to the efforts of cooperating agencies, Charlebois said the program will help create new resources to meet growing community needs.

"My goal is to keep the program going in a positive direction by recruiting more students." Charlebois said. "This is a great opportunity for GBC to continue their tradition of making a difference in the community."

Bret Murphy, dean of Applied Science at GBC, said the program will show participants how they can start finding careers that suit their inter-



Eliko — On Valentine's Day 2003, four of the Northwest's most acclaimed female musicians performed together for the first time — almost by accident — at a club in Portland, Ore. The irony that four talented, single women were without dates on the most romantic day of the year was not lost on them, and after a few drinks and some post-show commiseration, it began to look like fate.

They decided that perhaps four against the world would be more fun than single-handedly attempting the task, and they all felt strangely up to it. So after another round of backstage dirty martinis, a group was born.

This Thursday Dirty Martini performs in the Reynolds Amphitheatre on the GBC campus. The show opens with Elko native Joel Garcia, a young singer and song writer who has performed his solo act throughout the region. Admission to the evening of music, beginning at 7 p.m., is \$10, \$5 for students with ID and seniors citizens. In case of inclement weather, the performance will be held indoors in the college theatre.

The band now has three members: McKinley, Lara Michell and Stephanie Schneiderman. Each has earned individual success over the years with their own, critically-acclaimed CD releases, but the alchemy they've created together as Dirty Martini has helped them build a large and loyal audience in the Northwest; an audience that has embraced the group's eclectic mix of intimate lyrics, complex harmonies, serious songwriting skills and musical abilities.

McKinley has released two solo albums, "Big Top Shop Talk" in 1997 on original Santana drummer Michael Shrieve's Gold Circle imprint, which led to touring with label mate David Crosby, and "Goner" last year, both of which were ecstatically reviewed both locally and nationally.

Lara Michell, guitarist from Portland's Carmina Piranha, has also released two solo records, "Tide Pool" in 1997 and "Somniloquy" in 2001, an album The Oregonian described as "gorgeous dreamscape" chamber pop.



ELKO — One of the nation's former poet laureates, Billy Collins, will give a special March 23 performance at the Great Basin Theatre — one day after he arrives in Elko on his 65th birthday.

Collins' first-ever performance in Elko promises to offer a taste of poems that John Updike said "describe all worlds that are and were and some others besides."

Collins performance begins at 7 p.m.

Collins' work has been recognized nationally and internationally for its accessibility,

humor and style. He was the U.S. Poet Laureate from 2001 to 2003 and currently serves as the Poet Laureate for New York state.

GBC's Intellectual and Cultural Enrichment Committee organized the program as part of the school's humanities programming.

"It is so exciting to have someone of his caliber and approachability come to Elko," said Jeannie Rosenthal, a member of the ICE committee. "He writes about everyday things. He makes a statement about it and people can relate to that I think."

A typical Collins poem begins with a simple or humorous subject but ends with a twist. In "The Death of the Hat," he begins

with a story about the lost fashion of men's hats — which he describes as a standard male accessory during his father's life — and ends with a melancholy tone.

And now my father, after a life of work, wears a hat of earth,

and on top of that, a lighter one of cloud and sky — a hat of wind.

In a telephone interview, Collins said he tries to keep a casual sound in his poems.

"I don't write terribly formal poetry, but there is a lot of effort that goes into trying to sound spontaneous," Collins said. "The writing is not at all casual for me. It takes a lot of work and revision, but the result of the revision is that it makes it seem kind of spontaneous, like it is running off the tongue."

As a poet, Collins said part of his duties include lying on the couch and daydreaming, which he "tries to fit in as much as possible." He also spends a good amount of time as a distinguished professor of English at Lehman College, City University of New York, where he has taught for more than 30 years.

Collins has published nine books of his poetry and two audio collections, among other works.

Although he has never been to Elko before, Collins said he is looking forward to visiting the home of the Cowboy Poetry Gathering. "Cowboy poetry returns poetry to some of the things that it lost: Rhyme and meter, storytelling and a narrative quality," Collins said.

As the U.S. Poet Laureate, Collins started the Poetry 180 program, which collected 180 contemporary poems

Poet Collins recites to full house

ELKO - Last night's poetry recital by former U.S. Poet Laureate Billy Collins happened before a full house in Great Basin College Theatre.

With a gentle drawl, Collins went through 20 of his works. The majority had a humorous tone, reflecting Collins' outlook on life and the little idiosyncrasies that make us human. But whether funny or stoic, there was something philosophical to think about.

When host Waddie Mitchell greeted the audience with his charming "Howdy," he reminded everyone that poetry was one of the first great forms of artistic expression. When introducing Collins, he stated, "You're going to see it at its finest, finest achievement."

Mitchell also reminded the audience that Collins' visit was the first time this part of Nevada had been blessed with the presence of a poet laureate. From 2001-2003, Collins was the U.S. poet laureate. He is currently the poet laureate for the state of New York.

When Collins addressed the audience. he greeted them with a "howdy" of his own, sending the audience into side-

splitting laughter.

"My friends in New York were impressed that a cowboy poet was going to introduce me." Collins said.

one of the things he's noticed most about poetry is that people don't feel connected to the work. They often feel that they're not being spoken to. He compared that feeling to watching someone tvpe.

Another subject Collins addressed during his recital was that of teaching future writers how to establish their creativity. In reality, Collins said writing teachers don't teach students how to write, so much as they teach them how to re-write.

With laughter and approval at the end of each work - which ranged from reflections on the afterlife of a dog, to the whimsy of Virginia Woolf and even the form of poetry itself — Collins was finally met with a standing ovation from the capacity crowd.

"If there's a bumper sticker that says, 'I Love Elko,' I'm going to buy one, put it on my car and drive around New York," Collins said.

The event was free to the public, thanks to underwriting by the Nevada Arts Council and the National Endowment for the Arts. A similar recital in Boise last week had tickets going for Before launching into his first poem of between \$27 and \$30, according to the evening, "You, Reader," Collins said reports in Boise Weekly.





ELKO — As summer draws to a close and families begin to juggle the schedules of going back to school, Great Basin College offers flexible alternatives for life-long learning. Whether a student is pursuing a certificate or an associate or bachelor degree, GBC offers dozens of classes after 5 p.m. and on Saturdays.

"Northeastern Nevada is enjoying a robust economy right now, and people are busy at work. That's why GBC provides ample opportunities for students to enroll in classes that will fit with work and family schedules," said GBC vice president for student services Lynn Mahlberg.

The college offers all of its program requirements and electives in the evenings and on Saturdays. "We know that most of our students have work and family commitments. But we also know how valuable a college education is. We provide the access that makes a college degree an option for everyone,"

Mahlberg said.

According to the college, a student enrolled in six credits of course work should expect to spend another 12 hours outside of the classroom engaged in study. "That's a real commitment, but it's certainly manageable," said Mahlberg, "especially when one thinks of the increase in the earnings potential of someone with a college degree."

The college's Admissions Advising and Career Center has counselors available to help students meet the challenges committing to a college degree presents. GBC's teaching program putting graduates to work

ELKO — Nearly every single one of the graduates of the Great Basin College Bachelor Degree in Elementary Education Program, class of 2005, has been hired to teach in local school districts or school districts around the state.

Bonnie Hofland, the lead facuity for the Elementary Education Program said, "I'm like a proud parent. I watched our graduates as they participated in the orientation program for new teachers in the Blko County School District. Last year they were my students. Today they are teachers."

Twenty eight students graduated from the program last year. "One of our graduates is about to have a baby, so she didn't apply for a teaching position this year, but may be offered one anyway. And school districts haven't completed their new-hires for the year. The last two of our graduates are candidates for open positions," Holland said.

Started in 1999, the Elementary Education Program has produced over 100 teachers. The placement rate for GBC graduates is generally about 95 percent. "Our program now has early 80 students enrolled," Hofland said. "We've placed our graduates in the school districts throughout Nevada, and in Ari-

zona, Idaho, Texas, Utah and Wyoming. One of my students was just hired in Las Vegas. She said her principal told her that she had every single requirement he sought for teachers at his school. She was very well prepared."

This fall the college launches a bachelor degree program in Secondary Education as well. The program enables graduates to teach in grades 7-12. Concentration areas are offered in Mathematics, Social Studies, Biological Science and Career and Technical Education.

An increasing demand for secondary teachers in middle, junior high and high school exists both within Nevada and across the nation. With many school districts recruiting teachers outside the state, Great Basin College will now be able to provide "homegrown" teachers familiar with Nevada's cultural geography and rural settings.

"That's an important aspect of what we have accomplished," said GBC President Dr. Paul Killpatrick. "As a college, we have always responded to the needs of our community.

The festival plans forums, lec-

tures, discussions, films and gallery showings all centering on the theme of water. Representatives from state and local agencies will discuss Nevada water laws, the pros and cons of exporting water from one basin into another, and alternatives that would allow rural Nevada to keep its water while southern Nevada's water needs grow.

The week begins with a slide show and lecture by UNR art professor Peter Goin. Goin's latest work, "A Doubtful River," focuses on the Truckee River and the impact of development from Lake Tahoe to Pyramid Lake.

Goin will lecture and engage the audience in discussion at 7 p.m. in the Great Basin College Theatre. A small showing of his photographs will also be on display in the college library. Admission to the lecture is free to GBC students with ID. General admission is \$5. The evening's sponsor is the Nevada Arts Council.

On Tuesday at 7 p.m. the topic turns to the spiritual nature of water and its connection to the

Shoshone culture of northeastern Nevada. Earl and Beverly Crum of Owyhee and Judy Glasson of Elko will discuss Western Shoshone songs, dance and rituals to renew the earth's moisture.

The free demonstration will take place in the Reynolds Amphitheatre on the GBC campus. The evening is sponsored by Nevada Humanities.

A panel forum moderated by former Great Basin College President Dr. Ron Remington will address the issues of water in the Great Basin beginning at 7 p.m., Wednesday.

Sponsored by Nevada Humanities, the evening features Nevada State Water Engineer Hugh Ricci; Mike Strobel, a hydrologist for the US Geological Survey; Russ Plume, a USGS specialist on mine de-watering; and Dr. Tom Myers, a hydrologist from UNR and a consultant with Great Basin Mine Watch.

GBC students with ID are admitted free of charge. General admission is \$5.

On Thursday a documentary entitled "Running Dry" will be

presented in the GBC theatre. The film, produced and directed by James Thebaut and narrated by Jane Seymour, addresses the challenges of water consumption world wide, but focuses more specifically on the impact the rapid development of Las Vegas has had on the Colorado River basin.

The film screening is free and open to the public. A discussion of the film and its content will be facilitated by members of the film's production team.

FLKO — Great Basin College is making arrangements to enroll up to 50 community college students displaced by Hurricane Katrina.

The college has worked quickly to make accommodations for students. Faculty are making room in existing classes and will add course sections as they may be needed,

The lodging community in Elko has agreed to provide rooms for students and the Great Basin College Foundation has committed \$10,000 to provide meals plans for students when they arrive.

The Student Government Association will be making contact with student government organizations in the gulf region to help students make transitions.

"The college is targeting peer institutions whose students' needs are similar to the courses and services we can provide," said John Patrick Rice, the director of college relations at GBC. "We can accommodate single students who are in their first or second year of college. We want to help students who were

already enrolled in school and intended to start school this week."

The GBC Student Government Association raised nearly \$600 in an event on campus on Thursday. The money will be directed to the Red Cross. This week the Student Government Association will organize an Entertainment Marathon on the Elko campus. The marathon will be broadcast live on KELK and monies raised will be directed to Hurricane Katrina relief.

"The tragedy of Hurricane Katrina is compounded when we factor in the amount of education and training that will be lost in the coming months," Rice said. "The collapse of higher education in the gulf region is as catastrophic as the collapse of higher education during the American Civil War. It took generations to rebuild that system.

"We want to make sure we can do something to assure that those communities have smart, trained people who can help them to rebuild quickly."

HLKO — Great Basin College has been invited to discuss the possibility of administering a community college branch in Pahrump

The Community College of Southern Nevada currently conducts classes in the Nye County community 60 miles northwest of Las Vegas. The two colleges have been collaborating on the possible transition

"GBC was approached by members of the Pahrump community to discuss the possibility of administering community

college classes there," said GBC Director of College Relations John Patrick Rice.

Rice said that Pahrump's rural aspects, and GBC's experience administering similar branch campuses in Bly and Winnemucca were part of the reason for the interest. He also said that CCSN has been very involved in the discussions.

"Discussions between the people in Pahrump, CCSN and GBC are in the preliminary stage," Rice said. "It must be determined if it is the right opportunity for us and for Pahrump.







College Goal Sunday addresses student financial aid assistance

WINNEMUCCA — High school seniors and their parents squirming over that application for financial aid can find relief on Jan. 29 at College Goal Sunday.

The Great Basin College Elko and Winnemucca campuses will engage in a seminar to help students complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and to help advise them on ways they can afford college.

The event begins at 2 p.m. in the High Tech Center on the Elko campus, and in the GBC Winnemucca Center on Kluncy Canyon Road.

"The FAFSA is a tough form to fill out," said Scott Nielsen, GBC's student financial services director, "we hope to lower the anxiety level."

The FAFSA is a mandatory step in securing financial aid, Nielsen said. The federal government uses the application to determine students' and their

parents' expected contribution and how much money they are eligible to receive toward their education. Financial aid can come in the form of need-based grants and federally backed student loans.

Volunteers from the college's Student Services and Academic Affairs offices will be available to walk students and their parents through the forms. Lynn Mahlberg, GBC's vice president for student services, said the seminar will also connect students with the financial aid officers they'll be working with. "It's a great opportunity for students and parents to meet financial aid officers and begin financial planning. It's a good example of the kind of service a Great Basin College can provide to the community," she said.

College Goal Sunday is based on a program established by the Lumina Foundation for Education, a private foundation based in Indianapolis. It has been successfully implemented in Indiana, Arizona and now Nevada to help improve access to higher education.

The state of Nevada applied for and received a \$170,000 grant from the Lumina Foundation to host College Goal Sundays for the next three years, always either right before or after the Super Bowl. Mahlberg and Jeanne Rosenthal, GBC's grants coordinator, led the effort to write the grant.

Mahlberg said students should apply for a personal identification number to fill out the FAFSA application online in advance by visiting www.pin.ed.gov, but students can also fill out a paper application at the sites.

If under 23, students should bring their parents along with a copy of their 2005 income tax information for both student and parents. Students 24 and older only need their own tax information.



Great Basin College graduation set for May 19

ELKO — The Great Basin College class of 2006 will commence their professional lives in a ceremony on Friday, May 19, at 4 p.m. in the Elko Convention Center.

In all, 255 Baccalaureate and Associate degrees will be awarded this year, up from 220 last year.

Dr. Paul Killpatrick, president of Great Basin College, will preside over the proceedings. Former Great Basin College Professor of Education Dr. Nancy Remington of Elko was chosen by the student body as the commencement speaker.

Nevada System of Higher Education Regents Dorothy Gallagher, Thalia Dondero, James Dean Leavitt and Jack Scholfield will be in attendance as well

Regents Scholar Kathy Robbins of Winnemucca will address the graduating class. Robbins was honored by the Board of Regents for her academic achievements and leadership. Robbi Phillips, the outgoing president of the Student Government Association, will address the group as well. Carrie Rowley, who was honored with a national scholarship at the American Association of

Community Colleges conference, will assume the student government presidency in June.

Of the graduates, 44 will be receiving their Bachelor of Arts, a 33 percent increase from last year, 22 have earned a Bachelor of Applied Science, up nearly 15 percent over last year and 67 have earned an Associate of Arts degree, an increase of 25 percent over last year's numbers. A total of 15 earned an Associate of Science, a 150 percent increase from last year and 20 an Associate of General Studies, nearly 50 percent more than last year. Twenty students will receive certificates of completion in a variety of areas, up by nearly 40 percent over last

The only decline in graduates came in the Associate of Applied Science degrees. A total of 67 students earned their AAS. College officials attribute that decline to the region's good economy. Many students who would be enrolled in those courses are employed in the booming mining industry.


Honorary degrees are also being conferred. An honorary Bachelor of Arts degree will be awarded to Al Huber of Jackpot. Huber is a long-time supporter of Great Basin College and provided much of the energy during the college's founding days. Todd Hellman will be honored posthumously. Hellman was enrolled in the college's nursing program and working as a flight nurse for Access Air. He and three others were killed when their ship went down during a snowstorm as they were transporting a victim to the hospital. He will also receive an honorary Bachelor of Arts degree.

GBC also honors citizens for their community service. This year's Community Service honorees are Wes Bolen of Wells and Wes and Sue Dixon of rural Elko. All three have been instrumental in the advancement of the college's programs and facilities.
